

We are delighted to welcome Kevin O'Donoghue as our new clerk, who started with us on the 1st of October. He is also the clerk for Willersey Council and has much experience to draw on from there in dealing with the same individuals and departments at Gloucestershire Council and Cotswold District Council. Kevin has just found us a new auditor and is on the case sorting out our annual review of regulatory documents.

In September Tom Dixon was co-opted onto the Parish Council. He has done fantastic work on the Allotment & Community Orchard's




scheme, so we look forward to him bringing his enthusiasm & experience to the Parish Council.

Highways

As reported in previous issues of The Bugle we are pursuing Highways, via our County Councillor, to improve the signage at the Blockley turning and to



Interestingly, Cotswold District Council is now calling on the County Council to make 20mph the default speed limit for villages and towns across the Cotswolds in a bid to improve road safety in areas where vulnerable road users and vehicles mix.



Cllr Jenny Forde, Cabinet Member for Health and Wellbeing, says that this scheme is overwhelmingly supported by residents in the Cotswolds and has the full support of the Cotswold Community Safety Partnership. Cllr Forde has said that "The simple fact is that if you hit a pedestrian, they have a much greater chance of surviving if your speed is lower. The risk of a fatal injury when hitting a pedestrian at 40mph is 90 per cent and reduces to 2.5 per cent when driving at 20mph. That's why we are calling on Gloucestershire County Council, as the Local Highways Authority, to consult the county's District Councils, Parish Councils and communities to identify all the roads which should adopt a 20mph speed limit no later than 30 April 2025'.

The '20mph is Plenty' motion was put forward to Cotswold District Council's meeting on 22 September 2021 and received unanimous approval from Councillors.

Arguments in support of the introduction of 20mph include an analysis that rolling it out county-wide would involve be a one-off cost of £2.3m and that it would produce a saving of £480k p.a. medical and ambulance costs for the GCC and an expected annual total benefit of £5.7m p.a., all through a 20% reduction in casualties existing 30mph in Gloucestershire County Council will be considering a motion to introduce 20mph speed limits.

We have registered our interest in this campaign and will provide updates when there is any progress to report. Please also see the update from the Bourton Community Speedwatch team later in this edition.

COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH (CSW)

Representatives from the BotH speedwatch team met with PC Westmacott in the summer. We learned that as a result of the initial speedwatch campaign,



around 70 of the worst speeders were sent letters by the police who also made a couple of house visits to repeat offenders. Of course, no points or fines could be handed out as the speed-gun used by the group is not approved by the Home Office. It had been suggested by Stow Police that speedwatch groups could use a camera that would result in enforcements if the members of the team were properly trained and willing to appear in court. I stated that I would be willing to do both, but we have since been told by Stow Police that they are unwilling to commit resources to this proposal. Frankly, this is disappointing: if there were regular checks conducted in BotH resulting in enforcements, traffic speed would soon be reduced ensuring a safer and healthier environment for all.

Several other methods aimed at reducing the speed of traffic through BotH were discussed; the police suggested that we should start with the creation of a new speed limit of 20mph throughout BotH. The police said they would support such an application made to Gloucestershire Highways.








Overbury in 1615. Overbury was raised at Bourton House (the Tudor version of it).

OUR HUMBLE RED PHONE BOX

As many of you will know, there is a red phone box in Rectory Lane, and is unusual because it actually has a phone in it! Sometimes you see bemused walkers inspecting it, and especially (pre Covid) visitors from the Far East.



But it has more of a secret than many of us realise. The red telephone box was

designed by Sir Giles Gilbert Scott (1880-1960). A leading architect, Scott is famous not only for his telephone boxes, his achievements also include producing the winning design for Liverpool Cathedral and overseeing the rebuilding work required at the Houses of Parliament after the Second World War.

Scott's design of the K2 cast iron telephone kiosk won the Post Office sponsored competition in 1924. The red K2 telephone box was introduced to the streets of London in 1926. It was used solely in the capital and only a few were erected elsewhere. The K2 box was heavy and expensive to produce, so he produced an updated K6 design in 1935. The box in Rectory Lane is of the K6 design, it is in a Conservation Area and is listed as Grade II. So, it is rare and special.



You may have read about the review that British Telecom is doing of phone boxes in rural areas, with a view to decommissioning those that are used infrequently or not at all. Given that the mobile signal is sometimes non-existent where the box is, if it were removed there might be no way that someone could make a phone call. The message is "use it or lose it". Whilst it does not take coins, you can use a credit or debit card, so if you are passing it you might think about making a quick call (say to The Speaking Clock on 123) so it does not register as being unused.

Last week we had our annual pre-Christmas collection at Tesco.


