BOURTON HOUSE GARDEN

At last the tell-tale signs are here. From sunshine and longer days, to



birdsong and daffodils, nature is letting us know that it's once again time for Spring.



And with Spring Bourton comes House Garden throwing open our gates once again. We are now open every Tuesday to Friday 10am until 5pm, excluding holidays bank through until the end of October. Our

café and shop will open from May onwards.

Don't forget that during the month of April, entrance is just £5 per person and the tulips create such a welcome splash of colour. We plant around 3,000 tulips of many different varieties so there is something for everyone.



The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC) is a unique tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 which invites people from across the United Kingdom to "Plant a Tree for the Jubilee".

As you can see, the BotH village two English oaks (Quercus robur) were planted at the start of the year at the entrance to our Field Walk.

Being local, you might want to consider purchasing our 'Friends of Bourton House Garden' season tickets to experience the garden evolving through the months. They cost £24 per person and offer you unlimited entry to the garden from April through until October. Come as often as you like! You may have noticed the changes to the Parterre at the front of Bourton House. In 2021, the garden team decided to remove the thirty-year-old box hedging in both the Knot Garden and Parterre, which had been suffering from box blight. Blight spreads as tiny spores and is extremely difficult to control in an open garden. While it is sad to lose the box in these



areas, it has given Jackie and her team an opportunity to create new designs...for the next thirty years!

Phase 1 (formerly known as the Knot Garden) is being planted now and consists of topiarised English yew and laurel, interspersed with perennial plantings (tulips may follow next year).



We have renamed this area the Basket Pond garden.

Phase 2 (the Parterre) will use the established yew and laurel topiary and an annual wild flower design for this year.



Next year will see the Parterre planted up in its final form.

We're looking forward to hearing visitors' comments!

COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH

You may have spotted Adrian and team busy carrying out checks during the last 2 weeks. As usual, we're really grateful everyone who volunteered. A summary of recent activity:



- Several motorists have been caught multiple times during the checks, including twice during the same session.
- On Saturday 2 April, over 50% of vehicles were recorded as speeding, with two overtaking vehicles witnessed in the middle of the village.
- On Friday 1 April, the group witnessed and reported a collision by the pub where the offending driver drove off from the scene of the accident; a car descended Quarry hill at high speed, losing control on the corner of the bend and hitting an oncoming vehicle.
- Gloucestershire Police have sent out letters daily to speeding drivers.

We understand that carrying out CSW checks the police commitment increases enforcement in the village.

Adrian purchased a Bushnell speed gun last week because the Stow Police kit provided was heavy and unresponsive. We plan to buy a second gun shortly to enable dual checks to begin. This gives us the opportunity to catch



the same speeders twice in a session to illustrate the need for a comprehensive enforcement plan for the village as a whole. We are keen to enlarge the volunteer base to help deliver this goal.

We continue to gather footage of HGVs and other unsuitable vehicles battling with the pinch point to highlight the danger to

pedestrians.

BOURTON ON THE HILL HELP IN NEED TRUST

We want to make sure that everyone in Bourton on the Hill knows about the Help in Need Trust. Since the 1800s we've has been supporting people living in the parish at times of hardship and extra expense. Today, with the cost of living increasing rapidly, it's important you know that we are here to help if you need it.

Here are some examples of the kinds of thing the Trust has been able to help people with:

- Specialist equipment for someone with a disability;
- Course fees and books for someone studying for a professional qualification leading to new employment;

- Help towards the costs of fixing a boiler
- Helping with extra costs following a house move
- Travel costs to hospital and hospital parking
- Helping with heating costs
- Replacement and repair of essential home equipment such as cookers or fridges
- Unexpected one-off financial pressures.

These are examples, to give you an idea of the kinds of things we can fund. These funds are for the residents of the parish, so we do encourage you to get in touch if you feel we can help you, or someone you know, as long as they live in Bourton on the Hill.

- We can help with one off grants if things are difficult.
- We won't ask you to fill in any complicated forms.
- We can help you access the North Cotswolds food bank if needed.
- Anything you tell us is handled in strict confidence.

MEMORIES OF DAVID BOUCHER, 1933-2022

David who passed away in January aged 89,



lived in Bourton and the locality all of his life and therefore qualifies as one of our longest standing residents. Born at Batsford Lodge where he was one of seven siblings, his early arrival resulted in his being Christened at

home. David attended Bourton School and recalled watching whistling Italian POWs being marched up the hill to the local camp. The US Army's 'Super Sixth' Armoured Brigade was stationed nearby, and the GIs were popular with all the village children as suppliers of sweets, then under ration.

David's innate skill with animals became evident early on. David saw out his National Service with the Royal Artillery as a staff car driver; when his service ended David was offered a permanent post working with horses, but he declined knowing that he couldn't be happy away from the Cotswolds. After leaving the army David began his career working for Lord Dulverton at Batsford where his reputation grew not only as a skilled stockman with cattle and sheep but also as a dog trainer. Later, David worked freelance and local farmers called on his expertise to help with their sheep or cows.

Jean and David met at the Moreton branch of the Royal British Legion. At the time, Jean recently widowed, was learning to drive and David offered to help by providing extra lessons. It's a testament to both their temperaments that despite this potentially trying beginning, their relationship blossomed. David and Jean's association with the Moreton Legion lasted many more years with Jean as Stewardess and David as Branch Chairman. After their marriage in 1989, David

and Jean moved to their home in Fenhill Close where Jean lives today.

Over the years, both David and Jean have contributed their time and energies generously to village life. David served as a Parish Councillor for many years and along with Jean, helped to organise the catering at various events both at the Old School and at our fetes. David made good use of his allotment and was often to be found there, working to produce a variety of vegetables. In addition, and at a time of life when most of us would have welcomed slowing down. David worked with Robin Dale and the late Mike Gaden as a relief milker and shepherd respectively. I witnessed David's skills watching him move a flock from Rectory Lane to the upper field, his calm and efficient handling of the sheep making it short work. Those of us fortunate enough to have known David remember a gentle, modest man with a ready sense of humour. Devoted to his family and a much-loved grandfather, David is survived by Jean, a son and daughter from his first marriage, and two grandchildren.

FOODBANK BULLETIN

It has been another very busy few months at the North Cotswold Foodbank and at the Moreton outlet in particular. With the increasing cost of living and rises in fuel prices we expect to be just as busy in the months if not years ahead. Thanks to grants from the Trussell Trust we have been able to extend the provision of fresh fruit and vegetables through the Cotswold Veg Box Company to all of our outlets. We have been able to guarantee salaries for dedicated Citizen Advice Bureau advisors for the next 2-3 years. Emily Marshall and Morwenna Salmon have made a very good start supporting our clients, helping with debt, benefits and housing issues; this service will also be extended to Moreton once a new advisor has been trained.

The Chipping Campden outlet had a trial with Gloucestershire Health & Care NHS Trust as they hosted a walk-in vaccination clinic alongside their normal foodbank duties. This proved to be very successful with 18 people vaccinated and the trial will be extended to the other outlets if and when the need arises. The very profitable collaboration with Tesco continues as they have offered a van to help us with deliveries and collections, this will make a considerable difference to the running of the warehouse and donation collections. It should be around the roads of the north Cotswolds very soon and is recognisable for the large green logo on the side and back.

The Cotswold School have kindly offered us a slot to fund raise using their car park on Sunday May 22nd. All the proceeds from visitors parking for the day on the school fields will be donated to NCFB.
