PARISH COUNCIL

Highways

We met with Highways in April to discuss safety in the village. As a result Highways promised to clear away the land slippage from the footpath between the Horse &

Groom and the Longborough turning. This work was carried out in late July and the footpath is now wider and more useable.

Highways also promised to repaint all the white lines in the village and add some new white lines at the pinch point in the middle of the village. This work has yet to be done.

We have been discussing with Lynden Stowe, our County Councillor, a new type of community speedwatch camera, provided by a firm called AutoSpeedWatch, A



new scheme was launched this spring jointly by Glos Police and Glos Highways for this automated camera that will take photos of vehicles exceeding the speed limit by a nominated margin. These photos can then be sent automatically to the police who will issue letters to the vehicle owners with the aim of encouraging a change in behaviour. This



would be complimentary to the current SpeedWatch cameras and campaigns, it is not a replacement for that activity.

We have applied for funding for the camera itself and are now looking for funding for the annual running costs and the charge for letters sent out. Based on the photos taken by the camera the percentage of these that get sent letters will be controlled by the Parish Council as we will have to pay the police a fee of 50p per letter sent – so we will effectively need to budget a set spend per month. We are currently in discussion with Lynden Stowe about funding for all these costs.

Ideally, we would like a camera at both the top of the village (for vehicles entering from the direction of Evesham) and one for the bottom (for vehicles entering from Moreton). The initial funding application allows for one camera and as the survey last year showed the speeding to be a bigger problem near Fenhill Close, that is the one we have requested in the initial round of funding.

The hall is available for hire for private parties, rehearsals and other events at a charge of £10 per hour for non residents and £8 per hour for village residents Contact Sendra Gao 0





BOURTON HOUSE GARDEN

Well, what a scorcher that was. July was the hottest ever recorded so far - as



well as the driest and Jacky, Sandra and Glen worked amazingly hard to keep up with the watering on top of their other jobs. The Garden is still looking fabulous and full of late summer colour – the perfect time for a visit.

In the last edition of the Bugle, we wrote about the process of removing the box topiary from the parterre and the knot garden at Bourton House. By March we had planted up the permanent design for the knot. Here it is, this month. Over time we will shape the yew and laurel so that topiary continues as a theme in this formal area of the garden. The grasses will continue to provide year-round interest.



Visitors have liked the little pink flower, *Dianthus carthusianorum*, which gives points of vivid colour among the greens. The parterre has been sown with Pictorial Meadows' classic annual seed mixture: here it is throughout the seasons. By the way, the sunflower seeded itself and we didn't have the heart to dig it out! In the coming year we'll decide what permanent planting we want in the space.

We welcomed over 100 visitors to the garden on Sunday 14th August for our annual NGS day. The scorching temperatures meant that visitor numbers were down on last year, but we



had an enjoyable day raising money for charities including the Macmillan Cancer Support and Marie Curie.

The garden is open Tuesday – Friday 10am until 5pm through until the end of October. The Tithe Barn café and gift shop will close at the end of September, but there is still plenty of time to pop in and enjoy some of Carolyn and her team's delicious homemade treats.
